# HISTORICAL SKETCH OF CHAMPAIGN COUNTY, OHIO.

THE Territory now comprised within the limits of Champaign County, was formerly a part of Green and Franklin Counties. The county was formed March 1st, 1805, and assumed its present form March 17th, 1817, by contributing the southern part of its territory for the formation of Clark County, and being shorn at the North of the territory which now comprises Logan County. The first seat of justice was fixed at the house of George Fithian, in Springfield, and subsequently removed to its present seat—Urbana. The area of the county is 424 square miles, and had in 1870 a population of 24188, or 57 to each square mile. The soil is above the average in fertility. About one-half of the surface of the county is level or slightly undulating (whence the name Champaign), one-fourth rolling, one-fifth rather hilly, and the remainder wet prairie, and adopted to grazing. In the county may be seen many rich, extensive, and beautiful valleys; among these the Mingo, in the North-East part of the county, challenges the world for a rival in magnificence. The eastern third of the county, separated by the Ludlow line running N. 20° E. is a part of the land appropriated for satisfying the Military Land Bounty Warrants, issued to the state and Continental Troops of Virginia. This military land included all the territory between the Little Miami and Scioto Rivers. It was necessary to establish the boundary line of the tract between the sources of the two rivers. This line was surveyed by Israel Ludlow, and still bears his name. This land was never surveyed into regular sections. Locators were allowed to select their land, and establish the survey lines without observing any particular distance or direction, it only being necessary that the boundaries included about the number of acres to which their warrants entitled them. No system was observed in sub-dividing these original surveys, and it would appear to the mapist of this district that the surveying instruments used here were without cardinal points. The land west of the Ludlow line is regularly sectioned. The county is drained by Mad River and its tributaries, affording excellent mill privileges. The soil and climate admit of a great variety of productions. It affords good fruit, and is one of the first wheat counties in the State. It is divided into 12 townships, of which the following is a list with their respective population in 1870:—Adams, 1288; Concord, 1035; Goshen, 1965; Harrison, 944; Salem, 1854; Johnson, 2297; Mad River, 1803; Rush, 1789; Jackson, 1831; Union, 1600; Urbana, 1827; Wayne, 1729.

The population of the county in 1810, was 6303; in 1820, 8479; in 1830, 12137; in 1840, 16720; in 1850, 19728; in 1860, 22698.

Urbana, the county seat, is a beautiful city of the third class, having about 5500 inhabitants. The corporate limits include about 4.4 square miles; it was laid out by Col. Wm. Ward, in 1805 (the year the county was first formed), and has subsequently received 43 different additions. Col. Ward donated a large number of lots to the county, with the proviso that their sales should be appropriated for public benefits.

The first two settlers were Joseph C. Vance, father of Ex-Governor Vance, and George Fithian, who opened the first tavern in a cabin on a lot now owned by the Second M. E. Church. A Mr. Gibbs opened the first store in the same building, in March, 1806. A temporary Court House was erected in 1807. During the same year the Methodists erected the first church, a log structure, in the northeast part of town. It was afterwards used for a Castor Oil Factory for several years by Jas. Mathews. It was located on the lot now occupied by James Henley.

The first settlers in the village as recorded by Howe, were Joseph C. Vance, Thomas Pierce, George Fithian, Ed. W. Pierce, Samuel McCord, Zeph Sence, Ben Doolittle, George Ward, Andrew Ward, Wm. H. Fyffe, Wm. Glen, John Glen, Fred Ambrose, John Reynolds and Samuel Gibbs.

On the 4th of July, 1813, Corwin & Blackburn commenced the publication of "The Watch Tower," the first newspaper in the county.

Hull concentrated his army here before leaving for Detroit. They encamped in the east part of town on the lots now owned and occupied by T. H. Berry, E. G. Wiley, Jno. Kanaga, J. S. Carter, and Jas. A. Nelson. During the war of 1812, Urbana was a military town of no little importance. Troops were here encamped, and the town was a general rendezvous before "starting for the front." Sick and disabled soldiers were sent here—the old court house being used as a hospital. Here Col. Richard M. Johnson was brought wounded from the battle of the Thames and remained several days under a surgeon's care in a building on a lot now occupied by Nelsons Block.

Several institutions are located at Urbana, among which is the Urbana University, established in 1850, in the interests of the Swedenborgian or New Church, and is conducted under its auspices, and has for its object the education of youth in the useful arts and sciences, and in the true Christian Religion. The college grounds are in close proximity to the town and yet beyond the range of general habitation. They comprise some 30 acres of native forest and form a college site than which there are few more beautiful in the country. It has a small endowment, a thorough curriculum, and an efficient faculty. Another institution of prominence in Urbana is the Western Mutual Fire Insurance Company, J. H. Patrick, President. This Company has made three valuable additions to the city. (See Plat.) Still another institution is the Ohio Mutual Relief Association, P. B. Ross, President. A beautiful bronze monument (costs \$5,000) erected to the memory of Champaigns fallen heroes graces the public square. Champaign Co. is peculiarly favored with Railroads, there being no less than four: the Mad River, the Pan Handle and the Broad Gague, all of which intersect each other at Urbana, and the Springfield & Delaware R. R., clipping the southeast corner of the county, giving life to the enterprising town of Mechanicsburg.

It is not definitely known who was the first white man to settle within the limits of the County. It is generally believed, however, to be Wm. Owen, who came to the county about 1798, and settled on what is now the northeast quarter of section 15, Mad River township. The Indians were his only neighbors, with whom he became very intimate. They called him Kosko Elene, (Hogman,) he being a raiser of swine. In consideration of his leading the way to this wilderness he was allowed to select the land he wanted—a privilege granted to no other. He was satisfied with 240 acres contiguous to his home. He was proprietor of the first four-horse wagon that plied between the settlement and Cincinnati. He was a very profane man. At an early day the Baptists organized a church in the neighborhood, and Owen became a member. He was an habitual soliloquizer. One day when his patience was thoroughly taxed by the Indian's horses breaking into his cornfield, he was heard repeating to himself, "old Billy can swear a pretty good hickory yet."

After Owen came Jacob Minturn, Henry Vanmeter, Jacob Vanmeter, Nathaniel Cartnell, Justice Jones, Felix Rock, Thos. Anderson, Abner Barrett, Thos. Pierce, Benj. Cheney, Wm. Cheney, Mathew Stewart, Chas. Stewart, Parker Sullivan, John Logan, John Thomas, John Bunyon, John Lafferty, John Owens, John Taylor, John Guthridge, John Cartnell, John Dawson, John Pence, Jonathan Long, Bennett Tabor, Nathan Fitch, Robert Nowel and Jacob Pence. The celebrated Simon Kenton came as early as 1799 from Kentucky. He was accompanied by Thomas and Major Moore. They came with their families on pack horses. The Moores settled about 5 miles south of Urbana. Kenton was a resident of Urbana until within a few years of his death, which occurred in 1836. He took an active part in defending the settlements from hostile attacks of the enemy during the war of 1812. He is buried in Oak Dale Cemetery, and the slab that marks his last resting place bears the following inscription: "His fellow citizens will long remember him as the skillful pioneer of early times, the brave soldier and the honest man." Captain Arthur Thomas, among the earliest pioneers, lived on King's creek, three miles from Urbana. In the war of 1812 he was returning with his company from Fort Finley, where he had been sent to guard the public stores, himself and son lost their horses, and separated from the rest of the company to hunt them. They encamped at Big Springs, near Solomons town, near Belle Fontaine, and the next morning were found killed and scalped. Their bodies were brought to Urbana by a deputation of citizens.

## URBANA TOWNSHIP.

This is township 4, in range 11, and includes the north tier of section of range 10. It contains 42 square miles, of which 4.4 sections is included in the city of Urbana. The first election was held Oct. 8, 1811. There were 87 electors recorded in the town and township. Joseph Hedge and Daniel Helmick were Clerks. Z. Luce, Wm. Stevens, Wm. Glen, Judges. Among the electors we notice the names of Simon Kenton, John Gilmore, Thos. Moore, Wm. Rhoads and Wm. Powell. Samuel Powell, from Kentucky, settled here in 1809 with a family of 13 children. Abram Powell, a member of this family is in his 84th year, and still a resident of the township. He remembers of carrying shelled corn 50 miles upon a pack horse and exchanging for salt, pound for pound. They were much troubled by the thefts of the Indians. In stealing from him a very fine mare they were particular not to take a large bell that was upon the mares neck, but left it upon a worn out horse of their own. The hire of a horse to ride 50 miles to mill was 50 cents. He served in the war of 1812 under Gens. McCarty and Finley. He was in two engagements with Indians; both defeats. In the last engagement 5 were wounded; assisted in hauling them to Detroit, 15 miles distance, and left therein upon boats. He realized \$1.50 from the sale of a keg and a pair of boots that were

left in his wagon, and considered himself very wealthy with \$2.00 in silver in his pocket. In the southeast part of the township is the locality of what is known as pretty prairie. This is probably the finest section of the country, yielding the palm to no other in beauty and richness of soil. Two of the finest farms in this township are those of Mr. J. H. Patrick and Mr. W. J. W. Rawlings, views of both of which may be seen in this atlas. A number of other views of some of the finest estates in the township and county may also be seen interspersed throughout these pages. The Champaign County Infirmary, two miles south of Urbana, and the District Camp Meeting Grounds, three miles southeast of Urbana, are institutions worthy of note.

## SALEM TOWNSHIP.

This is the largest township in the county. It is township 5, in range 12, and includes two tiers of sections of range 13, and contains 48 square miles. At the first election, Oct. 8, 1811, forty-six electors were recorded. David Parkson, Joseph Vance, Clerks. Joseph Petty, Jno. McAdams, Mathew Stewart, Judges. Among the electors we notice the names of Robert McFarland, Jno. Vance, Abraham Powell, Jno. Reed, Bernard Corn and Wm. Riddle.

The first church erected in the township was the King's Creek Church in 1819 in the northeast part. Thos. Antrim was one of the first pioneer ministers, and was considered a great preacher in his day. The township contains two villages: Kingston, three miles north of Urbana and  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile from the A. & G. W. R. R., and Kennard, three miles northeast of Kingston, a station on the same road. Kingston was never surveyed and platted as a town, but lots were sold by metes and bounds. Recently its plat was recorded. Kennard was laid out in 1863, by J. Hedge. The north and east part of the county is drained by King's creek. This creek derives its name from King, a desperate Indian chief that was killed on its banks. In Kingston we formed the acquaintance of one of the counties venerable pioneers, Mr. Wm. Haller, who came to the county in 1812. Mr. Haller has performed his part in the long and laborous struggle with the heavy forest that was once spread over the entire territory. He is now in his 74th year, enjoying good health and a sound mind and body—an unusual thing—but Mr. H. has never formed the acquaintance of whisky or tobacco. Salem is among the best townships of the county. The soil is of an excellent quality, and is noted for its magnificent landscape views. If you would see some of the wealth of Champaign County, visit the "model farm" of the county, that of Mr. Jno. Enock, in the north part, and view his farm of about 2000 acres spread out before you. Then visit the farms of Jno. C. Yoder, P. W. Gunkle and A. C. Jennings, of which views may be seen in this atlas, and you will conclude that one could court no more desirable country.

## MAD RIVER TOWNSHIP.

This township includes all of township 4, range 11, and one tier of sections on the north side of range 10. It contains 42 square miles, or 26,880 acres. Mad River valley, upon the east, is from one to one and a half miles in width. The south is drained by Chapman and Storms creek; the north by Nettle and Spring creek. West of the River valley the surface is undulating. The pioneers were mostly from Virginia; some were from Kentucky and Pennsylvania. The township contains 12 schools, 7 churches and 5 flouring mills. This township received the earliest pioneer, Wm. Owens, referred to in the outline history. Thomas Pierce came from Kentucky in 1800, and settled where Samuel Storms now lives; he left it and built the first house where the city of Urbana is now located. Ezekial Arrowsmith came from Kentucky in 1801 and occupied the cabin that Mr. Pierce had vacated. Sampson Talbot and family came in the same wagon. He left his family at Simon Kentons, four miles north of Springfield, until the two men returned and drove the stock through, which took them some six weeks. Mrs. Arrowsmith, with three small children and a sister, remained alone during this time, the nearest house being two miles away, and Indians and wolves were numerous. Thos. Kenton came in 1802, Felix Rock in 1804, Archibald McCrew in 1809 from Pennsylvania, Phillip C. Kenton about the same year, Wm. Kenton in 1814, Robert McFarland, Geo. Robinson, Henry Bacom, are well remembered pioneers. Christopher Storms, settled early on the creek that bears his name. Thos. Redmond, Ruben Pence settled here early. Jno. Pence built a grist mill about sixty years ago, then considered the best in the county. They made and packed flour in 1815-16, hauled it to Wapakonetta, and also lumber with which to build boats, from whence he shipped it down the Anglaze to Ft. Defiance, thence down the Maumee to the lake and sold it to military posts and the inhabitants along the lake. Joseph Diltz, Henry Pence and David Loudonback, from Virginia, settled early, the latter married a daughter of Abraham Pence and are probably the oldest couple in the township, having resided here for about sixty years. In this township there are two small and unimportant villages, Terre Haute in the south, laid out in 1838 by Geo. Craig, and Westville in the north, laid out in 1815 by A. McGrew.

## CONCORD TOWNSHIP.

This township was organized in 1818 from Mad River Township. It is centrally located, and contains 30 sections of well improved land. It is township 4, in range 12. The earliest pioneer to settle within its limits is believed to be Joseph Hill in 1801, on the farm now owned by his son-in-law, Mr. Jas. D. Powell; Sampson Talbot came in 1804, and settled on the farm now owned by his son; Presley Jessie and Wm. Harbour came in 1805; Jas. Mitchell in 1806; Joseph Grey from Kentucky, and Robert McFarland in 1807; Joseph Longfellow from Kentucky, Christian Norman, Jno. Miller, Jno. Tipton, and Marcus Clark from Virginia,

in 1809; Sampson Talbot built the first school house in the township, on the north side of his farm, at the angle of the road south of Oliver Taylor's house; Wm. Woods, an aged Baptist minister, taught a school in it in the winter of 1812-13. He (Sampson Talbot) was worthy to be kept in everlasting remembrance for the many sterling virtues he possessed. He was born in 1767, near Alexandria, Virginia, and early in life became a member of the Baptist church. He was in the army that Washington sent out to the Monongahala country. He was the grandfather of the late Sampson Talbot, D. D., President of Denison University, Granville, Ohio, who, by his own untiring industry and indefatigable energy, became a distinguished Divine, Scholar and Preceptor. Samuel Mitchell was here at an early day and settled on section 3. Adam Wise, John Daniels and Isaac Anderson were also among the early pioneers.

In the spring of 1812, Robert McFarland moved into his cabin now owned by T. S. McFarland. The Methodists held their meetings at his house until the coming of Jas. Russell, when they were divided between the two places. Subsequently a log church was built on the west line of Concord Cemetery, which served as a place of worship until 1837, when the old brick church was erected. Thirty years afterwards it was supplanted by the present imposing edifice—Concord Chapel—of which a view is given in this atlas. About a furlong southwest of the Chapel there was at one time an Indian village. In 1812 fourteen huts could plainly be seen.

## HARRISON TOWNSHIP.

This is township 4, in range 13, including one tier of sections in range 12. It is the smallest township in the county and embraces 24 square miles. The soil is about an average in fertility. The township is drained by Gladys, Grave's, Muddy, Emery's, and Lee's creeks. Springhills, formerly called Middleburg, is its only village, laid out in March, 1832, by Jos. Woods.

## JACKSON TOWNSHIP.

Jackson township, named in commemoration of the hero of New Orleans, is situated in the south-western part of the county. It is the only square township in the county, and comprises an area of thirty-six square miles.

The first white families settling within its limits were John Cane and William Lemmon. They emigrated from Virginia in the year 1802, and settled in the eastern part. Geo. Wilson came in the spring of 1805 and settled on the north half of section thirty-six. Sampson Kelley, Thomas Cowie, Thomas Grafton and Mr. Darnell came in the year 1806. James Darnell, a son of the old pioneer still survives,

and we are indebted to him for much information in obtaining our history. Joseph Kelley, son of Sampson Kelley, aged 66 years, is the oldest white person living that was born in the township. Joshua Howell, Sr., settled on the present site of Addison in the year 1808. William Stapleton, aged 88 years, the oldest man in the township, settled upon the farm he now resides on in the year 1808. David Field settled south of Addison April 10, 1810. John Merritt and Thomas Foster came in the year 1813. Wm. Huddlestuz came in the year 1816, and settled on the farm now in possession of his son Lewis.

The only post office in the township is Addison, a quiet inland town, located in the south-western part. Addison was laid out by Joshua Howell, Jr., in 1817, and originally named Christianburg, in memory of the town they emigrated from in Virginia. It has about five hundred inhabitants.

At a very early date two families named Morgan and Bowyer settled at the head of Lost Creek. On the absence of Morgan, Bowyer was murdered by the Indians. He was buried by his friends, and the place of his remains may be seen on the farm owned by Allen Pence.

Chapman's creek, a small branch of Mad River, deriving its name from Chapman, he being the first to settle at its mouth, has its source in the township.

The west fork of Honey has its source in the Big Spring, located on Jeremiah Miller's farm. The east fork rises in the interior of the township, and has the remains of two beaver dams, which shows the workmanship of their builders that have long disappeared.

The township is amply watered by Nature's hand, with lovely springs and streams, and decorated with beautiful meadows and delightful fields, that may well supply the wants of man, and from the enterprising spirit manifested by its citizens, it bids fair to success in the future.

## JOHNSON TOWNSHIP.

Johnson township, situated in the western part of the county having an area of thirty sections, was named in honor of Silas Johnson, the first white man to settle within its present limits. He and his family, consisting of a wife, four sons and two daughters, came to the township in the year 1802, from Kentucky, and settled near the present site of Millerstown. After residing there a few years, and assisting in laying out the township, he removed to Adams township, where he remained until his death, and his daughters, Rebecca and Elizabeth, whose respective ages are seventy-nine and seventy-five years, still reside. To these aged ladies we are indebted for a large portion of our history.

The next family settling in the township was Mr. Carter, having two married sons and two son-in-laws named Cox and Fleming. They came in the year 1804, and emigrated farther west in the year 1807. Philip and John Long came in the year of their departure. Achory Berry settled in the year 1808. Philip Comer, Jacob Judy and Lewis Hanback in the year 1810, Joseph Kizer in the year 1812; following these were the Bodeys, Brubakers, and a few other families who may be considered among the pioneers of the township.

In the southern part of the township is located the flourishing little town, St. Paris, laid out by David Huffman, in 1831. St. Paris is situated on the Columbus Piqua R. R., having about one thousand inhabitants, and from the enterprising spirit of its citizens promises improvement in the future.

In the eastern part of the township is the small village of Millerstown, laid out by Jno. and C. Miller in 1837.

In the northern part may be found Mosquito Lake and Creek, deriving their names from the abundance of mosquitoes that infested their vicinity in an early day. The lake has a surface of about sixty acres, affording a fine place for fishing and duck hunting.

Nettle Creek, a small tributary of Mad River, named from the rank growth of nettles on its bank, has its source in the township.

The principle productions are grain, though the southern part is well adapted to stock raising.

The educational interest is large; its citizens are expending time and money for the promotion of knowledge in their midst, knowing it to be the corner stone of success to posterity.

## ADAMS TOWNSHIP.

Adams township is situated in the northwestern corner of the county. It was named in honor of John Q. Adams, being laid out about the time of his election to the Presidential Chair.

The first white man to settle in the township was Asahel Wilkison, he came in the year 1811, and settled on the farm now owned by his son Asahel. Daniel Neal came in the year 1814, and Geo. and Peter Halterman in the year 1817.

The only postoffice is Careysville, formerly called Trenton, laid out in 1830 by Calvin Cary, a small village situated in the southern part.

The township is new, but the northern part is well improved, and adapted to the production of grain and grazing.

## GOSHEN TOWNSHIP.

Goshen township is situated in the southeast corner of the county, and is a part of the Virginia Military lands, and contains 38 square miles. The soil is generally good. It is not definitely known when the first settler made his appearance in this township. From the best information we could obtain we fix the time about 1804. John Legg, from Virginia, came about this year; John Britton in 1806; Theodrick Spain, in 1807. Soon after came John Frankaberry, John Pepper, Wm. Mars, Wm. Burnside, Wm. Cheney and Amos Howard. Not one of these remain to tell the story of their hardships in effecting a settlement here.

David F. Spain, Eligah Legg and Joel Burnside, boys then, are still citizens of the township, having resided here for full 67 years. The settlement of the township was rapid and now contains 1965 inhabitants. In the year 1822 a severe tornado passed over the southern portion of the township. It was about one hundred yards in width and took in its course the house of Wm. Lafley, on the farm now owned by Thos. Wren, in which the people had gathered for public worship. The house was leveled to the ground but no one was injured. Mechanicsburg, on the Short Line R. R., near the center of the township, is the second town in the county. It was laid out in the year 1814 by John Kain, and has now a population of about 1200. Its location is beautiful and its dwellings are models of neatness. Within the corporation, which is one mile square, is the front entrance of the magnificent Central Ohio Fair Grounds. Nature has done much towards beautifying the ground, and some \$15,000 have been expended on improvements, making it probably the most beautiful Fair Grounds in the state. A corps of seven teachers, in a large and modern union school building, situated on an eminence overlooking the town, attend to the mental discipline of the rising generation. Maple Grove Cemetery, a plat of which is given in this atlas, is also an evidence of the enterprise of the citizens. In 1869 the citizens petitioned the township trustees, John Runyon, Lewis Britton, Edwin A. Gug, to levy a tax to purchase suitable grounds for a cemetery. Said trustees requested T. S. Cheney, Mayor of Mechanicsburg, to call a meeting of the town council to meet in joint session with said trustees. P. W. Alden, Wm. Martin, C. K. Clark, Jno. W. Legg, V. Hunter and A. R. Swisher constituted said council. A joint session was held and T. S. Cheney, P. W. Alden and Lewis Britton were appointed to select the ground. They reported in favor of the present site. The report was accepted and grounds purchased at a cost of \$3,180. It contains 30 acres. At the next regular election the people repudiated said action by defeating the election of the entire council and two of the trustees. Much opposition was manifested, but a present writing a better state of feelings exists, and about \$4000 have been expended in its improvement.

In 1815 there was a camp meeting held near Mechanicsburg. Bishop Asbury was there and preached, though in very feeble health. During the progress of the meeting some "crusader" found a canteen of whiskey. It was adver-

tised by one of the ministers from the pulpit and the owner requested to claim property. Some fellow, name now forgotten, whose girl was not a "crusader," claimed and carried off the prize.

The first Methodist minister to preach the gospel in these parts, was Hector Sanford, who preached at the cabins of the pioneers about 1810. Henry B. Bascomb is still remembered by some of the oldest citizens as being among the first and oldest pioneer preachers.

### RUSH TOWNSHIP.

Rush is the northeast corner township. It is township 7 and range 12. It contains 36 square miles of territory. The first settlers came to this township about 1805. Among these were Hezekiah Spain, Hurburt Crowder and William Johnson. In 1807 settled Thos. Goode and Joshua Spain. Soon after came Samuel Black and James DeVore. Thos. Irwin and Jonathan Cheney were early settlers near Woodstock. Andrew Kimball, from Virginia, settled here in 1817. Bela, his son, then 18 years of age, is still a resident of the township. He has lived here 57 years, and John Owen, his neighbor, has been here for 61 years. Willis Spain, son of Hezekiah, but a youth then, is still a resident of the township, having resided here for 69 years. He recollects that during the war of 1812 the settlers had but little fear of Indians, they being drawn to the Sandusky River at that time. They disappeared about 1828.

Lewisburg, in the north part, on the A. & G. W. R. R., is a thriving town of about 1000 inhabitants. In 1850 it contained 302 inhabitants; in 1860, 364; in 1870, 733. It affords a bank, several dry goods and grocery stores, drug stores, two furniture manufactories, two flouring mills, carriage factory, &c. Laid out in 1826 by Gray Gary.

Woodstock, formerly called Hartford, near the centre of the township, is a pleasant village, situated on the Columbus and Piqua R. R., and numbers some 300 souls. Laid out by S. and Phebe Smith, 1834.

### UNION TOWNSHIP.

This township is situated in the southeast part of the county, and is township 4, in range 11, including one tier of sections in range 10. It is well improved. The first election was held October 8, 1811, and polled 68 votes. Jno. Guthridge, Jacob Minturn and Joseph McLain, Judges. Benj. Cheney and Jno. Owen, Clerks. Among the early settlers were Jno. Ross, Stephen Runyon, Wm. Ray, Jno. Runyon, Thos. Pierce and David Vance. About two-thirds of the township is Military land and the remainder Congress. It is drained by Dry Run and Buck Creek. Mutual, formerly called Texas, is the only village in the township. It is centrally located. It was laid out in July, 1846, but no original plat was ever made and recorded until July, 1869.

### WAYNE TOWNSHIP.

This is one of the northeast townships of the county, and is a well improved township of land. Abner Barrett was the earliest settler; he came about the year 1800. After him came J. P. Spain and Gordon Reams. Jacob Johnson came in 1808, and settled on the farm now owned by Alfred Johnson, near whose house is a celebrated spring around which was once located an Indian village. The Indians were much attached to this place on account of its beauty and healthfulness. If the reader will take an imaginative view of this place 70 years ago and then turn to page 32 of this atlas, the present will be seen. Salem was the first church erected in this township, in which was taught the first school by Thos. Goode. There are three villages within the township: Mingo, on the A. & G. W. R. R., is a small but beautiful village on the east of the fertile Mingo valley. It was laid out in 1866 by E. C. Williams, and is a convenient

shipping point for the inhabitants. Middletown, now nearly "gone out," is near the centre of the township. It was laid out by J. Miller in 1833. Cable is a live town on the Columbus and Piqua R. R. Laid out in 1853 by P. S. Cable. This township is No. 6 in range 12.

### CONCLUSION.

The writing of the history of the territory now within the limits of Champaign County, previous to its settlement by the whites, is not practical. If it was, it would doubtless render many of its localities classic ground. Seventy-six years have come and gone, since the first pioneer made his advent within the limits of what is now Champaign County. What changes have been wrought within this short space of time. When those fearless pioneers penetrated this wilderness they found the country without any of the elements or fruits of civilization. There were no villages, churches, schools, railroads, merchants, markets, mechanics, mills or cultivated acres to invite them here. Savage beasts, venomous reptiles, uncivilized men, and heavy forests, save a few acres that had yielded to the rude efforts of the savage welcomed their coming. Who does not possess a feeling of veneration for those noble men who encountered those dangers and privations, and founded civilization, which in its train of blessings, has developed the country into one beautiful garden, enjoyed by an enlightened and Christian people, among whom the anthems of praise to the bountiful giver of all is heard upon every hand. Religion and Education have made rapid strides co-extensive with the growth of the country. Common schools have reached a state of perfection, which each succeeding year gives to our youths increased mental discipline, which is the basis the ground work of our free institutions. Churches are lending a power to influence the morals and piety of the community.

From a few brave and hardy pioneers the population has multiplied to thousands, with proportional increase in religion, science and general intelligence. With our fertile valleys and hills, rich in agricultural wealth, our undeveloped resources, and the example of the past, what may we not a loyal people, hope for in the future.

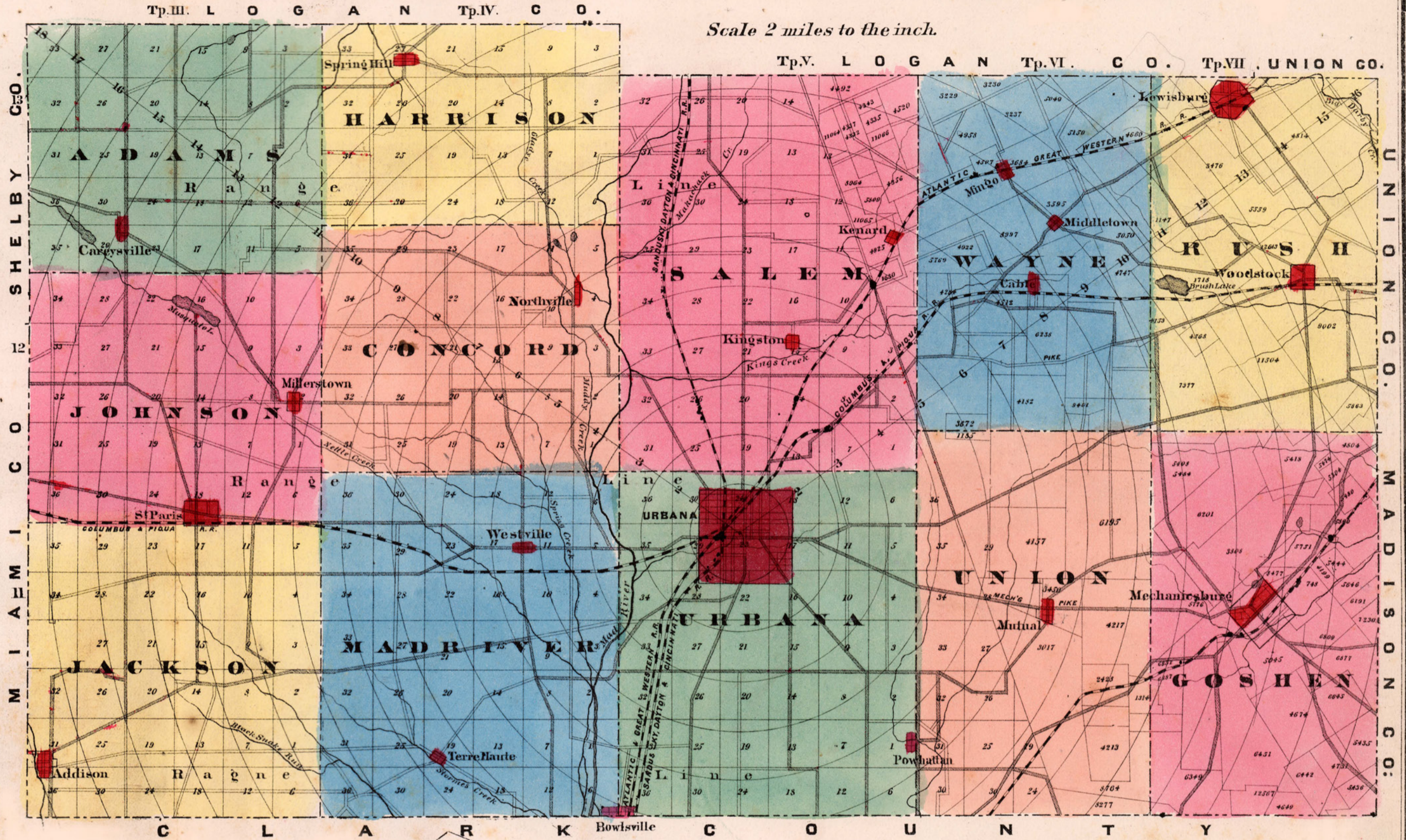
