The Union County Sheriff's Office Patrol Division includes Patrol Operations, Special Enforcement Operations and the Special Deputy Bureau.

The Patrol Operations primary function is law enforcement and is composed of uniformed Deputies, Public Safety Officers (PSO) and Special Deputies (Reserves). They respond to calls for service, emergencies and crimes anywhere in the county, around the clock, 365 days a year.

Special Enforcement Operations includes overweight truck enforcement, speed enforcement trailer and school bus violation enforcement.

Special Deputy Bureau is a group of volunteer deputies who assist the Sheriff's Office with a variety of operations. These volunteers are peace officer certified in the State of Ohio and are required to meet all training and certification mandates. The Special Deputies assist with working patrol duty, traffic control at parades and providing security at local events. In addition, they are called upon to assist with searches, major investigations and community service programs.

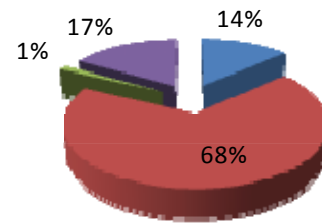
Crash Reports

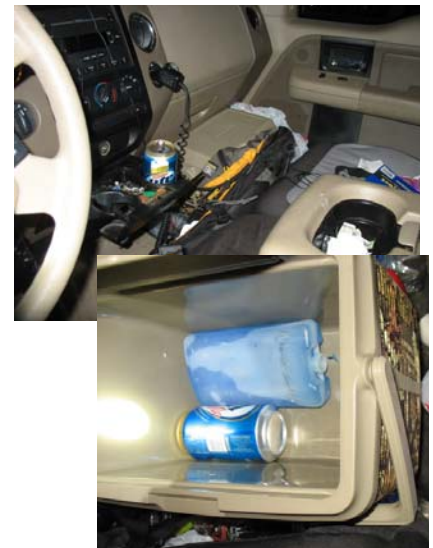

The UCSO takes drinking and driving very seriously; we work very hard to keep our roads safe for the citizens of Union County and for those traveling through.



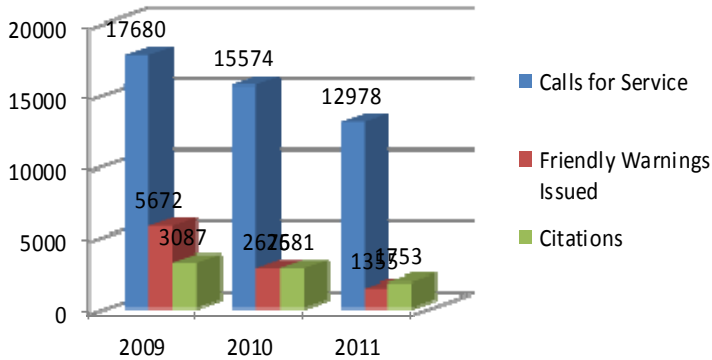

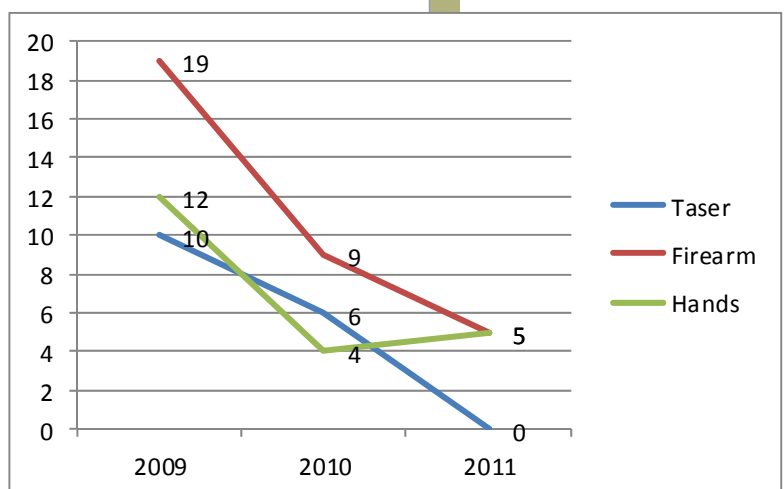

Public Safety Officers (PSO)

The Public Safety Officer (PSO) Program has full-time deputies who are cross-trained with the skills needed to also be an emergency medical technician and firefighter. The deputies currently patrol the county in four-wheel drive vehicles loaded with medical gear and firefighting equipment. This equipment includes turn out gear, including an air pack; a full medic bag; and an automatic external defibrillator. This equipment allows the deputies to respond to the scene and be prepared for any type of emergency and be trained to handle the situation.

We have 10 townships and 1 village who have a dedicated deputy assigned to their area; they all have entered into a contract for these services. The PSO's make a determined effort to get to know the people of their township or village. This allows residents to feel the deputy is specifically looking out for their safety, which is an aspect of a current trend in law enforcement known as community policing. This means the deputies and the public work together to deter crime in their area.

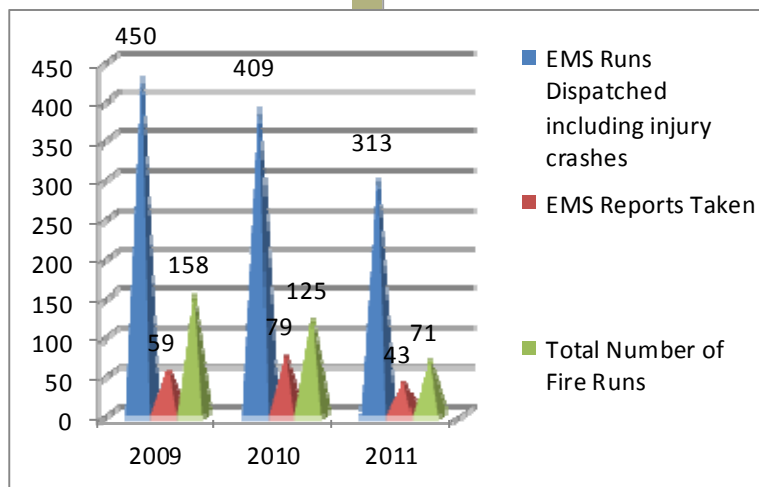
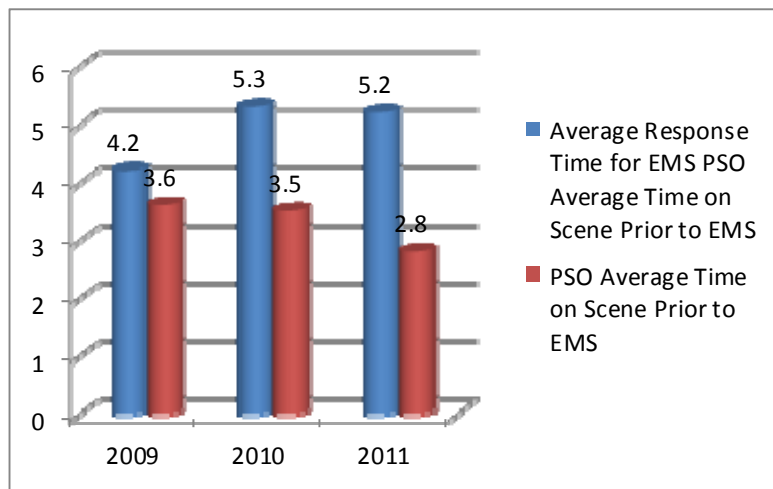

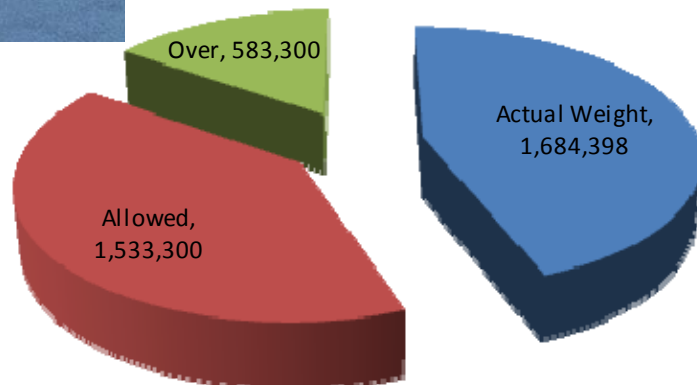

The Union County Sheriff's Office utilizes our K9 team for daily law enforcement work as well as many specialized K9 operations, such as tracking; crowd control; building, area and article searches.

K9's are used by law enforcement due to their sense of smell, bark and sense of hearing. A K9's sense of smell is almost 50 times more sensitive than humans. They can discern a particular smell even when there are dozens of smells in the area. A dog can quickly sniff out criminals, drugs, weapons and bombs in situations where a human officer would have to search every inch (a dangerous and time consuming task) and the officer still may not find anything.

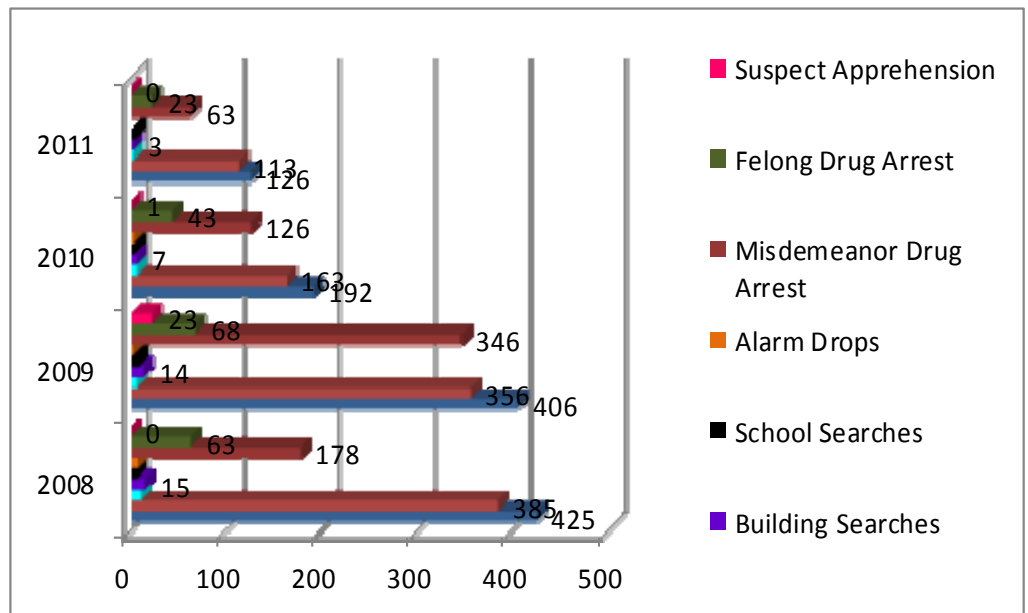
The commanding bark of a well trained dog often leads criminals to surrender. Criminals cannot intimidate or scare these dogs nor can they reason with them. The presence of a police dog often times protects an officer from physical confrontation.

K9's can hear twice as well as people. They can detect sounds that are too faint for the human ears and even sounds pitched at frequencies above and below a human range.

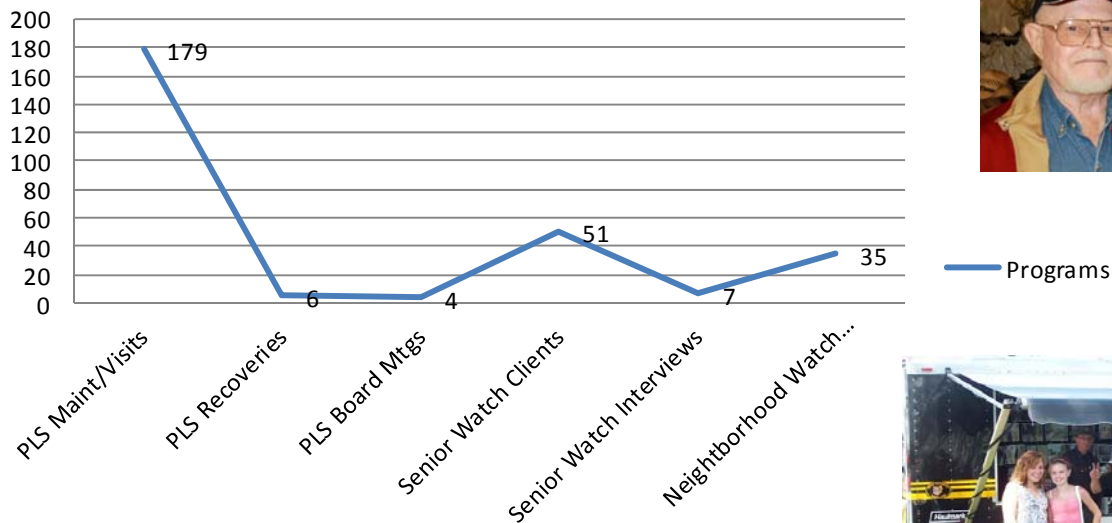

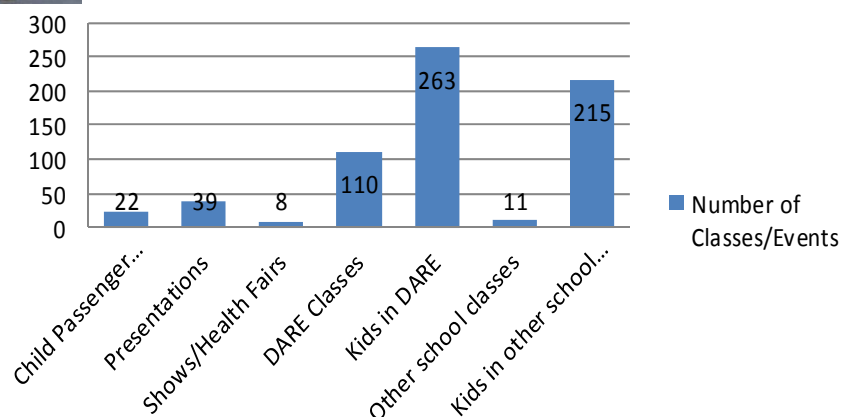

In 2011, the Special Deputy Bureau consisted of 13 Special Deputies. By the end of 2011, we were able to add 3 additional volunteers for a total of 16 Special Deputies. All members of the Special Deputy Bureau are trained certified peace officers who volunteer their time and expertise as a force multiplier in support of the mission of the Union County Sheriff's Office. We have Level I Special Deputies who have the authority to perform their duties the same as a full-time Deputy without direct oversight. The Level II Special Deputies, in most cases, must be accompanied by a Level I or full-time Deputy.

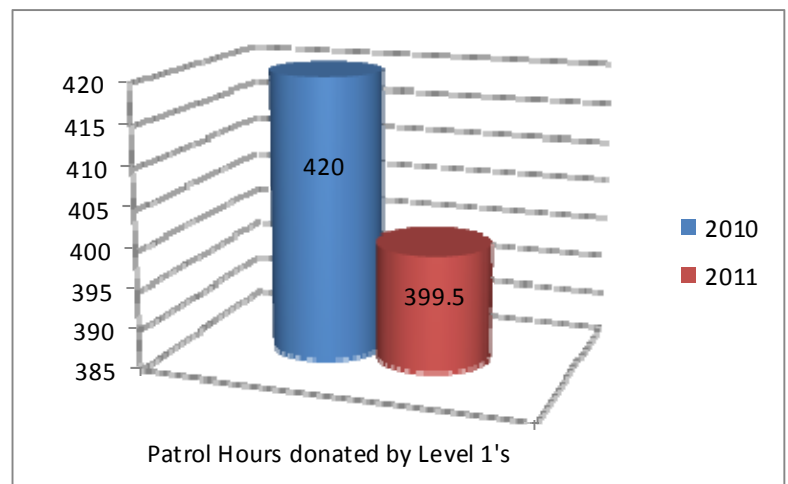
The Special Deputy Bureau has monthly training meetings throughout the year. Each Special Deputy is required to attend a minimum of eight (8) monthly meetings. In-house instructors along with instructors from outside law enforcement agencies, as well as municipal, state and federal law enforcement agencies provided training for our special deputies. Some of the training received in 2011 was First Aid, AED & CPR; Baton, Taser, OC, legal updates, court security, Ohio Homeland Security Operations, visually impaired laws and Gator training.

Hours Donated

The Level I Special Deputies attended monthly meeting totaling 47 hours, with 40.5 hours donated during the Union County Fair and 65.5 hours for mandatory training.

Level II Special Deputies donated a total of 477.5 hours with 82 hours attending monthly meetings, 43 hours working ball games, 218.5 hours working miscellaneous events and 134 hours for mandatory training.

A total of 933 hours were donated by the Level I and Level II Special Deputies.

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The Union County Sheriff's Office Investigations Division is comprised of several areas of criminal investigation. In general, the division is assigned to investigate felony-level crime which means any crime of a more serious nature. Within this wide spectrum, detectives are trained to investigate specific types of crime relating to narcotics, computers, burglary, murder, death scenes, sexual assault, white collar theft, fraud, arson and many other areas of criminal activity.

In addition to their responsibilities as investigators, detectives are also trained as crime scene technicians. As determined by the uniformed deputy sheriff first responding to a crime scene, a detective may be summoned to the scene to photograph, collect and preserve vital evidence which may lead to the identification and successful prosecution of a suspect. Detectives are trained and utilize an array of techniques for gathering various types of evidence produced at a crime scene such as latent fingerprints, DNA, shoe prints, bodily fluids and trace evidence.

A primary focus of the Investigative Division lends itself to the war on drugs. A detective is specifically assigned to gathering intelligence and developing various methods to infiltrate and dispel the criminal society of drug trafficking in Union County. With the recently growing trend of heroin abuse, efforts have intensified to thwart this insidious progression.

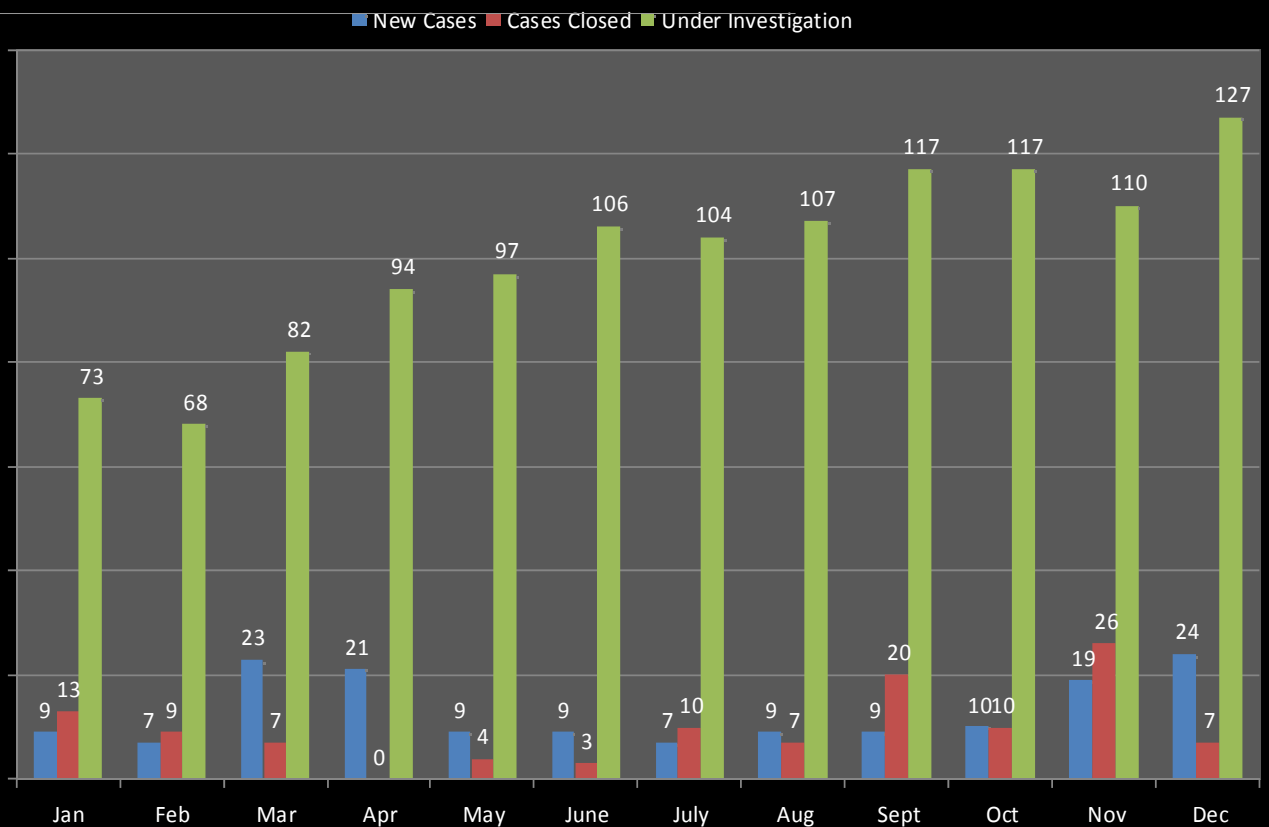

2011 - Investigative Division Case Management By Month



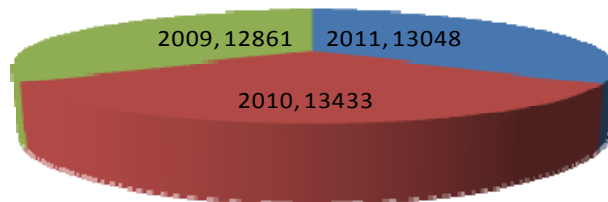

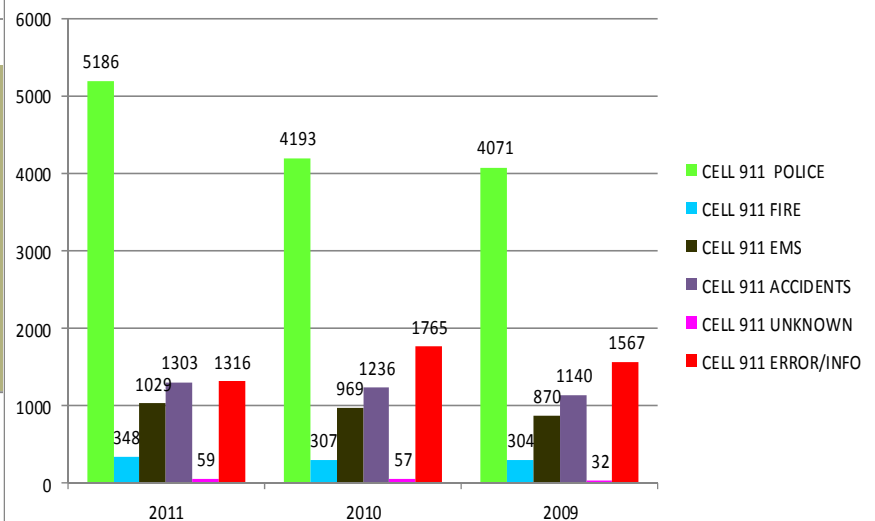
The Communication Division is responsible for receiving and dispatching calls for service (including 9-1-1 calls), as well as dispatching for 7 Fire and EMS Departments. The dispatchers on duty must monitor 10 phone lines (which include 7, 9-1-1 lines), 4 radio frequencies, TDD, 2 alarm central station receivers, LEADS computer, airport monitor, weather and tornado sirens, warrant computers and greet the general public.

The Union County Sheriff's Office currently has an Enhanced 9-1-1 system. When a 9-1-1 call comes in (with the exception of a cellular phone) the dispatcher automatically has information such as address, phone number, owners name, and the police, fire and medical jurisdiction. The Union County Sheriff's Office is also Phase 2 compliant so when 9-1-1 is called on a cell phone the technology is available to locate the caller.

Total 911 Calls Per Year

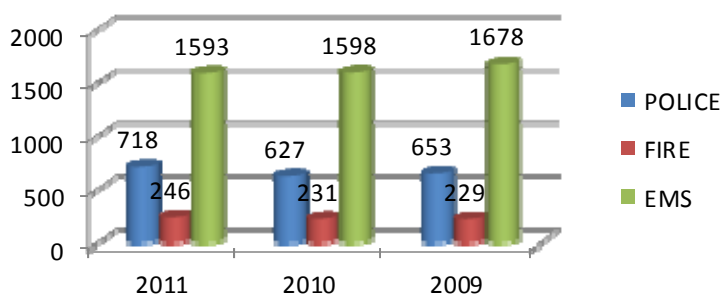


Cellular 911 Calls

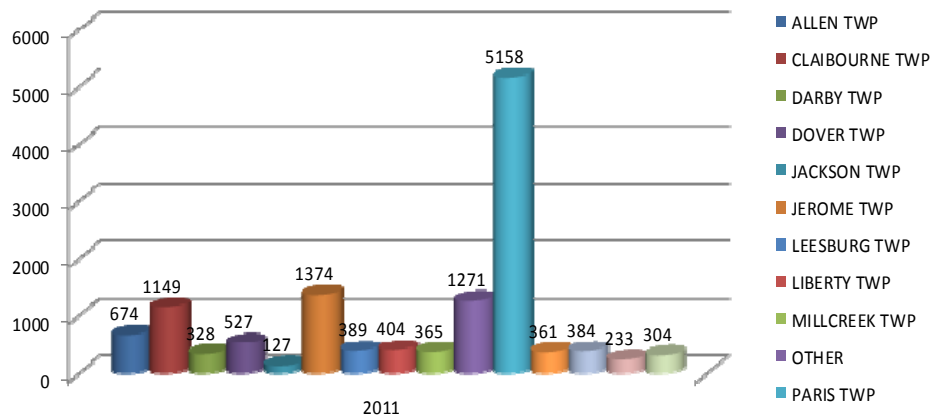

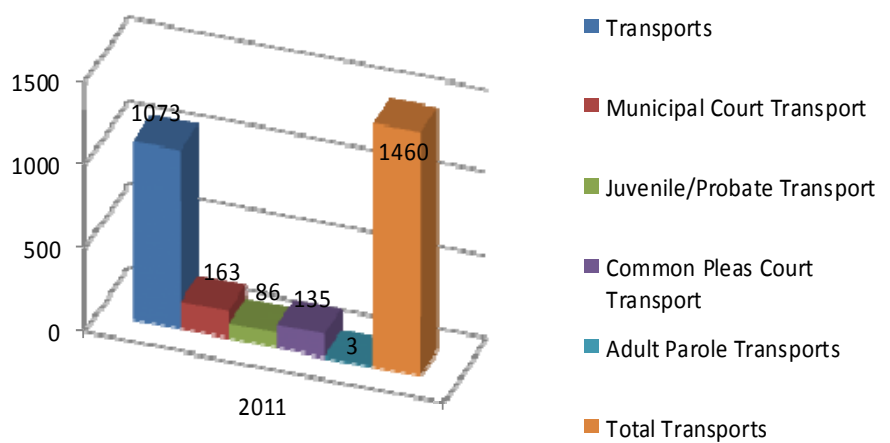

Court Services is responsible for maintaining security at the Justice Center, Common Pleas Court and the Juvenile/Probate Court. In addition they are responsible for transporting prisoners and juvenile detainees to and from the appropriate detention facilities as well as court hearings. The Civil Process Clerk processes all court paperwork including civil papers and warrants for service by the Patrol Division; with assistance from a Court Service Deputy; handles all aspects of Sheriff Sales and property executions; coordinates transports with Court Service Deputies; enters and maintains files for citations and friendly warnings. The Records Clerk is responsible for all background checks including Web Check requests for the public and insurance companies for copies of accident and incident reports; handles all requests for statistics of officers, outside agencies and general public. Court Services is also responsible for registering Sex Offenders within the county, civilian fingerprinting and handling Conceal Carry registrations.

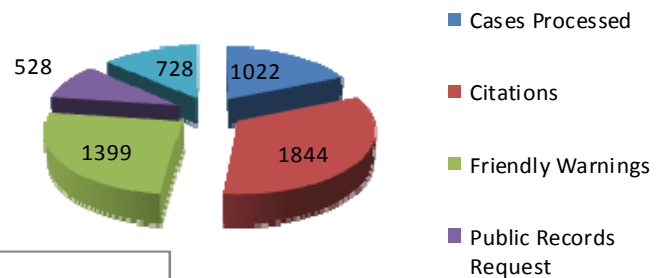

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION

The Administrative Division is responsible for providing administrative support on a daily basis with numerous tasks, including but not limited to, human resource functions such as file maintenance, personnel administration, employee benefits and background investigations; financial functions such as accurate reporting, budgeting, inventory, grant research and funding; accounts payable functions, such as purchasing and processing purchase orders, payroll and the quartermaster system; accounts receivable functions, such as invoicing, receipt recording and processing pay-ins; research and development; legal matter; policy and procedures; contract negotiations and labor management.

- Revenue paid into the General Fund in fiscal year 2011 totaled \$1,132,331.35.
- Managed the Sheriff's Office budget of \$6.8 million which includes expenses from Tri-County Regional Jail and the 9-1-1 Center.
- Received \$583,433 from Public Safety Officer contractual relationships with participating townships and villages.
- Received \$241,610 in stimulus grant funds.
- Collected \$124,082 in fees for all Sheriff's office services.
- Received \$54,888 in grant funds for Crime Prevention programs.
- Received \$7,668 in donations for the Sheriff's Office K-9 program.
- Received \$3,489 in grant funds to purchase EMS supplies and to offset prisoner healthcare costs.
- Collected \$2,500 from other law enforcement agencies for use of our training facility.
- Received \$1,925 in cruiser use fees for special duty details.
- Collected \$1,250 in Pay for Stay and DRC Housing.
- Provided funding for the purchase and installation of two in-car video camera systems.
- Coordinated the purchase of two new vehicles in the fleet rotation.
- Shared in funding replacement ballistic vests for five deputies.
- Wrote 117 receipts for Sheriff's Sales totaling \$2,003,934.



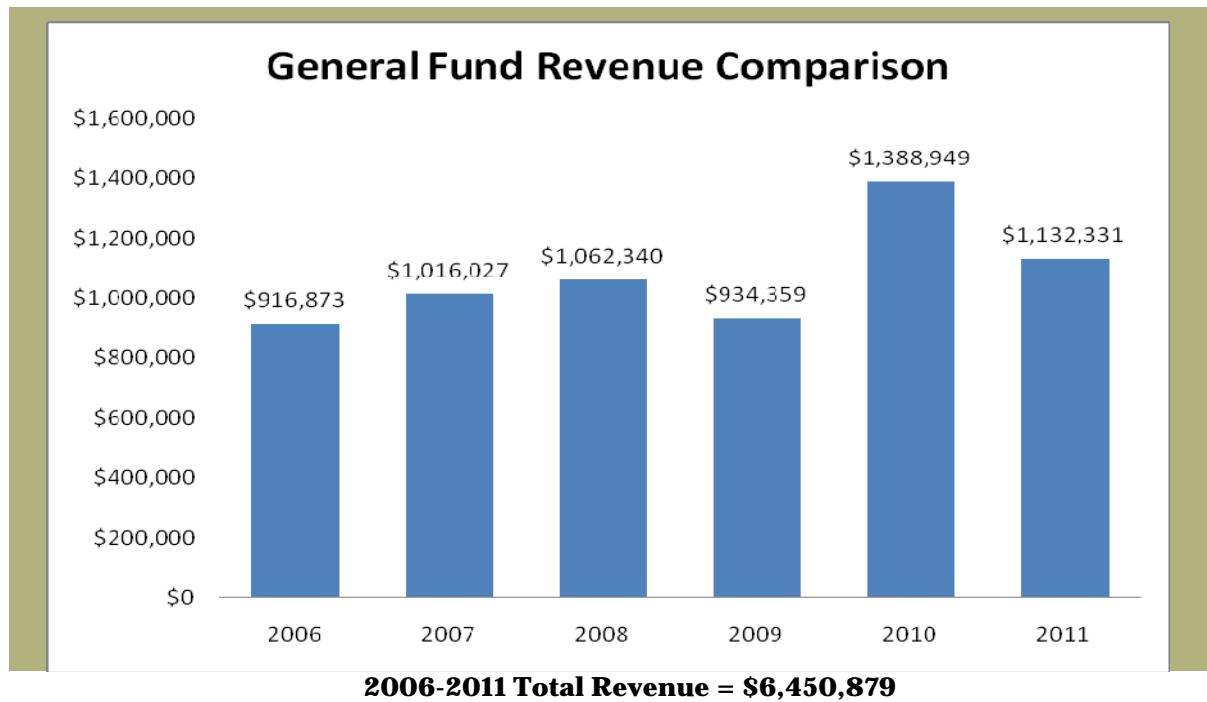

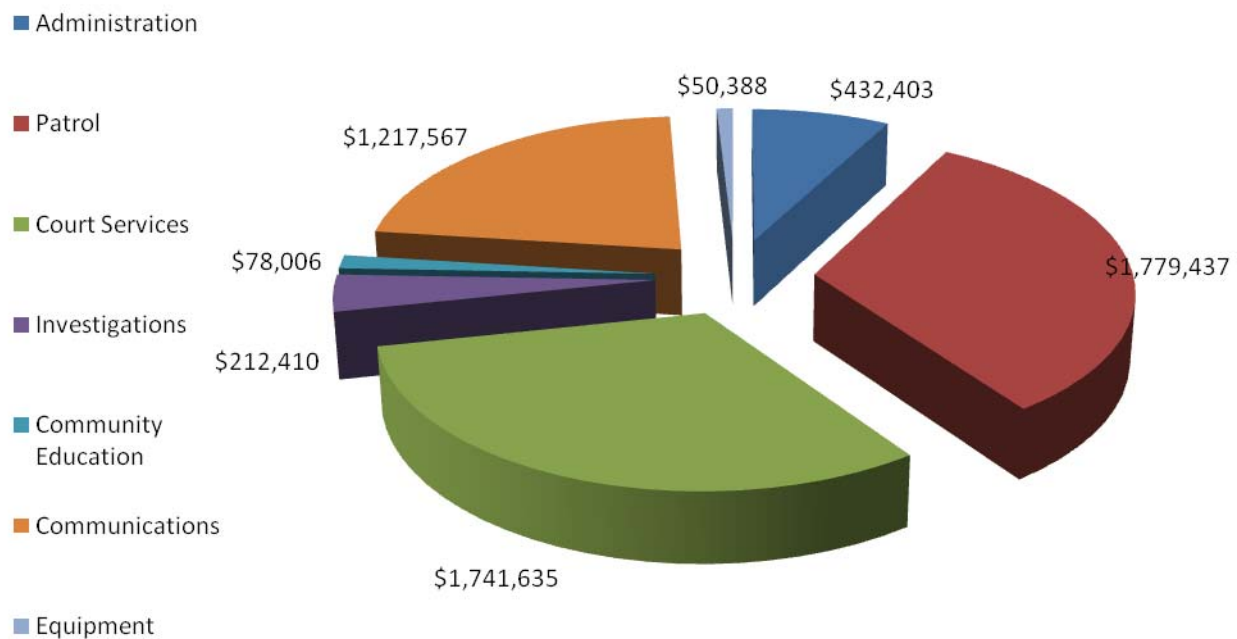

2011 EXPENDITURES—ALL DIVISIONS

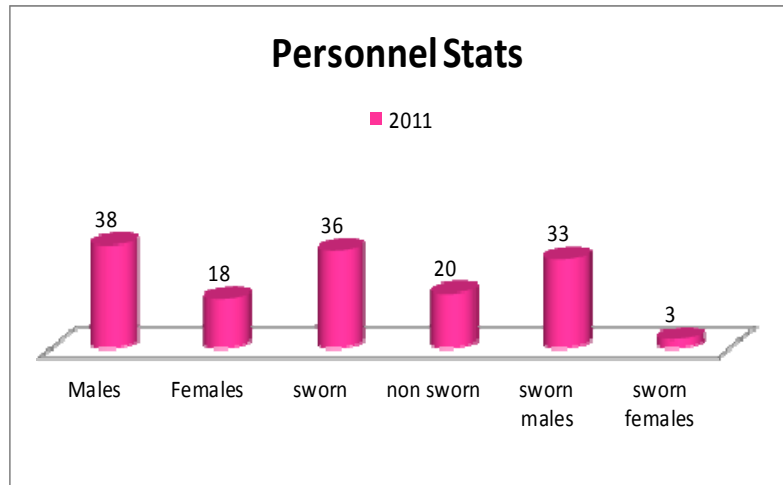

Master Evidence Technician

Deputy Shawn Golden is awarded the Master Evidence Technician certification by the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy for completing over 360 hours of training. Shawn is the second deputy to attain this certification. Shawn completed the last class for this certification in December of 2011.

Life Saving Award

Deputy Pete Lenhardt is awarded the Life Saving Award. On the evening of Wednesday, September 21, 2011, Deputy Pete Lenhardt, while off duty, demonstrated care and compassion in recognizing a neighbor (John Allen) was experiencing a stroke. He evaluated the patient and eventually convinced him to go to the hospital, even though he did not want to go. Deputy Lenhardt called for an ambulance to come and the paramedics reached the same conclusion about the patient's condition. Deputy Lenhardt drove Mr. Allen's daughter (Rebecca Rausch) to Riverside Methodist hospital, due to her emotional state. Deputy Lenhardt's family stayed with Mr. Allen's wife, because she has Dementia/Alzheimer's. At the hospital, it was discovered that Mr. Allen had a large brain bleed and he needed surgery. Medical staff stated if he had waited very much longer to be evaluated, he may have died within the week.

Deputy Lenhardt, without hesitation utilized his PSO training, recognizing a potentially life threatening condition and worked to get the patient to an appropriate facility and supported the affected family throughout the initial event. His actions reflect very positively on himself and the Union County Sheriff's Office.
