ANNUAL REPORT

Message from the Sheriff

In April 2012, I concluded my first full year as your Sheriff learning very quickly our office would have some obstacles to overcome with the 2012 budget. All office holders were presented with the daunting task of cutting 12 percent from each of their budgets, which came out to \$361,765.00 for the Sheriff's Office. I can tell you this was not an easy task! The main objective as your Sheriff was the need to retain the staffing we had currently and this meant we would not fill a total of three positions at the Sheriff's Office in 2012 in order to save money.

Our office is the largest County General Fund budget, which meant we took the largest hit on the 12 percent reduction. We re-structured the Sheriff's Office staff to save money and jobs. The loss of three positions in 2012 brought the total loss in ranks at the Sheriff's Office to twenty-six, over the past three years. A total of seventeen had been laid off; including ten full time deputies, one

part time deputy, and six civilian employees. This was in addition to nine open positions that could not be filled. Since 2009, the Sheriff's Office budget has been cut by over 1.2 million dollars.

As you can see, our office has suffered and suffered dearly over the past few years. Programs, jobs and enforcement projects have either been scaled back or eliminated. This was accomplished at a time when the criminal activity in our community either stayed the same or continued to increase with the growth Union County has been experiencing. As our great County continues to be one of the only three counties in the State of Ohio undergoing this positive growth, I would like to assure you as good stewards of the Citizens of Union County the Union County Sheriff's Office will continue to work within the budget we are given while doing our very best to protect the residents of Union County.





OPERATIONS DIVISION



The Union County Sheriff's Office Operations Division includes the Patrol Bureau and the Investigations Bureau.

The Patrol Bureau's primary function is law enforcement and is composed of uniformed Deputies, Public Safety Officers (PSO) and Special Deputies (Reserves). They respond to calls for service, emergencies and crimes anywhere in the county, around the clock, 365 days a year. Also a part of the Patrol Bureau are the Special Enforcement Operations and Special Deputy Bureau. The Special Enforcement Operations work overweight truck enforcement, use of the speed enforcement trailer and school bus violation enforcement. The Special Deputy Bureau are a group of volunteer deputies who assist the Sheriff's Office with a variety of operations. These volunteers are certified peace officers in the State of Ohio and are required to meet all training and certification mandates. The Special Deputies assist with working patrol duty, traffic control at parades and providing security at local events. In addition, they are called upon to assist with searches, major investigations and community service programs.


The Investigations Bureau is comprised of several areas of criminal investigation. In general, the bureau is assigned to investigate felony-level crime which means any crime of a more serious nature. Within this wide spectrum, detectives are trained to investigate specific types of crime relating to narcotics, computers, burglary, murder, death scenes, sexual assault, white collar theft, fraud, arson and many other areas of criminal activity.

Impaired Drivers






In 2011, the Union County Sheriff' Office (UCSO) arrested 50 impaired drivers. For 2012 the UCSO made 46 impaired driving arrests.




Public Safety Officers (PSO)

The Public Safety Officer (PSO) Program has full-time deputies who are cross-trained with the skills needed to also be an emergency medical technician and firefighter. The deputies currently patrol the county in four-wheel drive vehicles loaded with medical gear and firefighting equipment. This equipment includes turn out gear, including an air pack; a full medic bag; and an automatic external defibrillator. This equipment allows the deputies to respond to the scene and be prepared for any type of emergency and be trained to handle the situation.

We have 10 townships and 1 village who have a dedicated deputy assigned to their area; they all have entered into a contract for these services. The PSO's make a determined effort to get to know the people of their township or village. This allows residents to feel the deputy is specifically looking out for their safety, which is an aspect of a current trend in law enforcement known as community policing. This means the deputies and the public work together to deter crime in their area.



K-9 Program

The Union County Sheriff's Office utilizes our K9 team for daily law enforcement work as well as many specialized K9 operations, such as tracking; crowd control; building, area and article searches.

K9's are used by law enforcement due to their sense of smell, bark and sense of hearing. A K9's sense of smell is almost 50 times more sensitive than humans. They can discern a particular smell even when there are dozens of smells in the area. A dog can quickly sniff out criminals, drugs, weapons and bombs in situations where a human deputy would have to search every inch (a dangerous and time consuming task) and the deputy still may not find anything.

The commanding bark of a well trained dog often leads criminals to surrender. Criminals cannot intimidate or scare these dogs nor can they reason with them. The presence of a police dog often times protects the deputy from physical confrontation.

K9's can hear twice as well as people. They can detect sounds that are too faint for the human ears and even sounds pitched at frequencies above and below a human range.

In 2012, Deputy Roberts and his K-9 Partner Idor were called out 64 times to assist with searches for the Union County Sheriff's Office, the MADE Task Force, 4 other Law Enforcement Agencies including the Ohio State Highway Patrol. Of these 64 uses, 23 times contraband was located, resulting in 15 Felony and 16 Misdemeanor charges. Along with assisting others, they also had 514 other calls for service.

This duo gave five (5) public demonstrations to show what a K-9 is used for in the Law Enforcement field.

The Union County Sheriff's Office Community Education Program consists of Project Lifesaver, D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education), Senior Watch, Neighborhood Watch Programs and Crime Prevention. Since 2010, Deputy Kim Zacharias leads these programs for the Sheriff's Office, providing much time and energy to make these programs

possible.

Deputy Zacharias is also involved in the Triad/SALT Council, UC Volunteer Guardian Program, UC Drug Free Coalition, BSSA DARE Committee and the Ohio Crime Prevention Association. She also attends many community functions, such as the Union County Fair, Pleasant Valley Steam Threshers, Balloon Rally, Richwood Fair, Safe and Sound and school science fairs






In 2012, DARE was taught to kids in Fairbanks Elementary School, North Union Elementary School, St. John's Lutheran and Trinity Lutheran Schools for a total of 249 kids graduating from this program.

Union County has 41 Neighborhood Watch groups with four new groups started in 2012.

Deputy Zacharias attended 27 Community presentations with seven (7) at the schools, fourteen (14) for Seniors and six (6) for the general public.

Also in 2012 we have provided thirteen (13) address signs for homes in our rural areas and nine (9) cell phones to be used for emergencies.

Citizens Academy

On November 26, 2012, the Union County Sheriff's Office graduated their first Citizens Academy. The class met for twelve (12) weeks to learn about the Sheriff's Office. The class begins with the history and overview of the Sheriff's Office; Communications; Patrol (which covers the requirements of a Deputy) traffic stops, domestic violence, response to resistance/Taser, community education and public safety officers (PSO), K-9 and special response team (SRT); Investigations/CSI;



investigations and drugs; then they learn about court services and background checks and the final week is a trip to the Regional Tri-County Jail.



Each week builds on process of how the Sheriff's Office works and it teaches our Citizens how the Union County Sheriff's Office functions on a daily basis. This academy is offered twice a year with a limit of twelve students for attendance.



The Union County Sheriff's Office along with the Mental Health and Recovery Board of Union County, NAMI of Ohio and Consolidated Care, Inc. have come together to provide Crisis Intervention training for our local law enforcement. This training is provided for Law Enforcement, Parole, Probation, Corrections and Security Officers, Dispatchers and Mental Health Providers.

This training provides these professionals the tools and information needed when

confronting someone with mental health issues, it assists them with how to effectively manage a person with mental illness.

On November 1, 2012, the first class successfully completed the 32 hour training receiving a certificate of attendance.



SPECIAL DEPUTY BUREAU

The Special Deputy Bureau is divided into 2 levels. Level 1 Deputies volunteer their time primarily in an effort to augment the services of the patrol forces, while level 2 Deputies provide support and security for school and community events such as high school football and basketball games and the inmate work programs. All volunteers also donate their time at the Union County Fair. The Bureau donated collectively 1,275 hours of service time to the community and an additional 105 hours of monthly meeting hours for 20 12.

Safe Heroes Golf Classic



The Special Deputy Bureau is a self-supporting entity, so in 2012, the Special Deputy Bureau held the "Safe Heroes Golf Classic" raising over \$12,000.00 for the purchase of body armor to be used by our volunteer deputies.

This outing will be an annual event to help sustain not only the costs to keep our volunteer Deputies safe, but also to assist the Union County Sheriff's Office with the cost of Community

Education Programming. The funds will allow our

office to give our Special Deputies the tools they need to assist our full-time Deputies in keeping the Community safe and will allow us to continue programming in our Community. The 2013 golf outing will be held at Buck Ridge Golf Course on September 27, 2013.





INVESTIGATIONS BUREAU

The Union County Sheriff's Office Investigations Bureau is comprised of several areas of criminal investigation. In general, the bureau is assigned to investigate felony-level crime which means any crime of a more serious nature. Within this wide spectrum, detectives are trained to investigate specific types of crime relating to narcotics, computers, burglary murder, death scenes, sexual assault, white collar theft, fraud, arson and many other areas of criminal activity.

In addition to their responsibilities as investigators, detectives are also trained as crime scene technicians. As determined by the uniformed deputy sheriff first responding to a crime scene, a detective may be summoned to the scene to photograph, collect and preserve vital evidence which may lead to the identification and successful prosecution of a suspect. Detectives are trained and utilize an array of techniques for gathering various types of evidence produced at a crime scene such as latent fingerprints, DNA, shoe prints, bodily fluids and trace evidence.

A primary focus of the Investigative Division lends itself to the war on drugs. A detective is specifically assigned to gathering intelligence and develop various methods to infiltrate and dispel the criminal society of drug trafficking in Union County. With the recently growing trend of heroin abuse, efforts have intensified to thwart this insidious progression.








COMMINICATIONS DIVISION

ANNE BARR DIRECTOR

The Communication Division is responsible for receiving and dispatching calls for service (including 9-1-1 calls), as well as dispatching for 7 Fire and EMS Departments. The dispatchers on duty must monitor 10 phone lines (which include 7, 9-1-1 lines), 4 radio frequencies, TDD (Telecommunications Device for the Deaf), 1 alarm central station receiver, LEADS computer, warrants and greet the general public.

The Union County Sheriff's Office currently has an Enhanced 9-1-1 system. When a 9-1-1 call comes in the dispatcher automatically has information such as address, phone number, owners name, and the police, fire and medical jurisdiction. The Union County Sheriff's Office is also Phase 2 compliant so when 9-1-1 is called on a cell phone the technology is Director Anne Barr available to locate the caller.



Director Betsy Spain Court Services Division

Court Services is responsible for maintaining security at the Justice Center, Common Pleas Court and the Juvenile/Probate Court. In addition they are responsible for transporting prisoners and juvenile detainees to and from the appropriate detention facilities as well as court hearings. The Civil Process Clerk processes all court paperwork including civil papers and warrants for service by the Patrol Bureau; with assistance from a Court Service Deputy; handles all aspects of Sheriff Sales and property executions; coordinates transports with Court Service Deputies; enters and maintains files for


citations and friendly warnings. The Records Clerk is responsible for all background checks including Web

Check requests for the public and insurance companies for copies of accident and incident reports; handles all requests for statistics of deputies, outside agencies and general public. Court Services is also responsible for registering Sex Offenders within the county, civilian fingerprinting and handling Conceal Carry registrations.


2012 Expenditures – All Divisions




2012 Expenditures – Patrol




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
2012 Expenditures – Court Services




2012 Expenditures – Investigations









Life Saving Award

Deputy Rod Wilson and Deputy Aaron McKinnon were awarded the Life Saving Award.

On the evening of October 7, 2012, Rod and Aaron responded with the Liberty Township Fire Department to an EMS call at a home on Martin Welch Road. Arriving at the same time as the medic crew from Liberty Township, the responders found that the victim was experiencing a heart attack. Rod and Aaron assisted the crew getting the patient out to the Medic. The patient went into full cardiac arrest and Rod was asked to join the medic crew and provide CPR. Aaron followed the medic to Memorial Hospital of Union County. The patient was revived after being shocked seven times and was released from OSU Hospital on October 12, 2012. The STEMI Program at the Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center recognized Rod and Aaron, as well as the crews from Liberty Township and Marysville FD, for an outstanding job in delivering lifesaving emergency cardiac care.

Crisis Intervention Team

The UCSO began a training initiative in 2012 that was literally years in the making. The concept of Crisis Intervention Team's (CIT) is not new in law enforcement. The training gives deputies and other emergency responders the ability to successfully deal with those experiencing a mental health crisis. This training finally came to fruition beginning in May 2012. Matt Henry and Rich Crabtree became the first deputies from UCSO to successfully complete this training. In November 2012, Aaron McKinnon, Scott Robinson, Tom Bidlack, Kelly Nawman, Shawn Dyer and Katie Gallagher completed CIT training.

Sheriff's Office Citations

Deputy Shawn Golden was nominated for Deputy of the Year. However, based on his nomination, the UCSO Awards Committee has chosen to recognize him with a Sheriff's Office Citation for his outstanding contributions to law enforcement while assigned to the Court Services Division. Shawn has consistently been flexible in assisting the Court Services Division during difficult periods of low staffing. Without complaining, he regularly adjusts his shift, comes in early, stays late, and demonstrates a willingness to be a team player. Shawn has also volunteered to help cover "on-call" time in the Investigations Bureau. Shawn has been complimented by Judges and Magistrates for his professional demeanor and appearance in handling problems and tasks in the courtrooms. Shawn supports fund raising causes such as the Cystic Fibrosis Battle of the Badges, the Military Family Support Group, the Elks National Foundation, and Cerebral Palsy.

Mike has a wealth of knowledge and is always willing to assist others with their investigations and mentor fellow deputies. He is an excellent resource for the deputies at UCSO and has shown them how to file for subpoenas, search warrants, and conduct interviews. His work ethic is outstanding and he is extremely thorough with his cases. He is flexible, creative, enthusiastic, and passionate about law enforcement in Union County. He really makes a difference every day in our community.

Deputy Matt Henry and Deputy Rich Crabtree are being presented Sheriff's Office Citations for their work with the Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) program. Matt and Rich serve the as CIT Program Coordinators for UCSO and as Instructors for CIT training. They were the first two UCSO staff members trained in CIT. They are being recognized for their outstanding contribution to law enforcement for assisting in the development and implementation of the first CIT training program in Union County. Nineteen students successfully completed the first Union County CIT training. As a result of their initiative to get trained, their commitment to develop CIT training in Union County, and their leadership; law enforcement and other emergency responders will be better prepared to deal with those experiencing a mental health crisis.

CIVILIAN CERTIFICATE OF RECOGNITION Brian Violet, Jr.

On May 1, 2012, at approximately 12:55 am, Vanessa Edwards was driving on St. Rt. 287 in Union County, approaching the intersection of Stokes Road. Ms. Edwards had just gotten off work and was on her way home. She did not stop for the stop sign at Stokes Road and drove off the roadway and her vehicle became airborne. Her vehicle landed in a pond approximately 40-50 feet from shore. The vehicle began to sink. Ms. Edwards crawled out the passenger side window and got on the roof of her car. A witness to the crash, Brian Violet Jr., went to the edge of the pond and called 9-1-1. Dispatchers at the Union County Sheriff's Office received the call and sent deputies and units from the Allen Township Fire Department. Mr. Violet was able to communicate with Ms. Edwards and learned that she could not swim. After calling 9-1-1, he decided to swim out to the now submerged car and get Ms. Edwards. He swam to her and then brought her back to the bank. Ms. Edwards was transported to Memorial Hospital of Union County by Allen Township paramedics. Today, the Sheriff's Office is honoring Mr. Brian Violet for his act of bravery. He was willing to swim out to Ms. Edwards and assist her to shore at great risk to his own personal safety. It is encouraging to know that there are still good Samaritans in our community that are willing to act in an emergency to help someone in peril.
