



Director's Letter

Union County Human Services provides services to our community including job search and readiness; food assistance; time limited cash assistance; Medicaid; subsidized child care; child support orders and collection; transportation; support services specific to seniors; and adult and child protection services.

In 2021, our office lobbies were closed to the public until July 6, 2021. Prior to July 6th we were assisting individuals and families with phone appointments and internet applications. Our Children Services and Senior Services departments continued to work with individuals and families in their homes and community settings. Due to the lobbies being closed for half of the year we had a decrease in the number of individuals we served in our Ohio Means Jobs Union County center but a significant increase in the number of employers we served. Our Food Assistance Program saw an increase of the annual amount of client benefits for our residents. Our Children Services Department handled fewer investigations but had a significant increase in the number of children in custody of the agency. Our Child Support Department was able to increase the child support collected for Union County children. Union County Agency Transportation Services significantly increased the number of trips provided for our seniors and those in need of medical transportation. Senior Services significantly increased the number of seniors receiving case management services.

Ohio Means Jobs (OMJ) Union County is Union County's center for employment resources and business services. The center includes Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) and Comprehensive Case Management and Employment Program (CCMEP) services. Consumers can receive assistance including job search, job skills, job training, education, and resume writing. Businesses receive services including job posting, applicant screening and referral, employer orientation and interviewing.

• WIOA funds expended on participants: \$34,146

* Ohio Works First (OWF) provides time-limited cash assistance to needy families with (or expecting) children, by furnishing parents or specified relatives with work, training, and other support services they need to attain permanent self-sufficiency while meeting the family's ongoing basic needs. The funding for this program is a mixture of federal and state funds.

*The Food Assistance Program provides food assistance to eligible low-income Ohioans.

*Child Care is a subsidized program that financially assists eligible Ohioans to obtain child care for their children while they work, go to school or are in a training program. Parents or caretakers can choose a provider or center that is licensed, certified, and held to maintaining and complying with regulatory inspections and policies.

**Child Support provides services to help ensure that children receive the financial and medical support they are entitled to. By working with both parents, the program seeks to establish and enforce support orders and maintain consistent support payments.

Senior Services provides services for community members ages 60 and older. The funding for this program is from the Senior Services Sales Tax Levy.

Adult Protective Services (APS) investigates allegations of abuse, neglect, self-neglect and exploitation against Union County residents, ages 60 and older.

Union County Agency Transportation Services

(UCATS) provides transportation services primarily to residents needing assistance getting to medical appointments and seniors, ages 60 and over.

Children Services investigates/assesses allegations of abuse, neglect, and dependency of children. The goal is to protect children from harm and to maintain children in the least restrictive setting safely. Children services provides foster care and adoption services to provide temporary or permanent homes to children when it is not safe to remain in their home.
