



### Director's Letter

Union County Human Services provides services to our community including job search and readiness; food assistance; time limited cash assistance; Medicaid; subsidized child care; child support orders and collection; transportation; support services specific to seniors; and adult and child protection services.

In 2020, we found ourselves quickly adjusting our service delivery methods to ensure safety of our staff and clients as the Covid-19 Pandemic hit. In April we closed our lobby to the public and overcame technology challenges to provide staff the capability to work remotely. Some of our services were provided via the internet and phone while others still maintained the mandate of face-to-face client contact to ensure safety of our vulnerable clients. At no point throughout the year did we stop offering any of our services. We opened our lobby in July and in November adjusted to appointment only. I am very proud of our staff and the resiliency they have shown throughout this pandemic!

Significant increases from 2019:

- OWF new applications processed increased 103%
- Adult Protective Services investigations increased 96%
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP or food assistance) increased 33%

Ohio Means Jobs (OMJ) Union County is Union County's center for employment resources and business services. The center includes Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) and Comprehensive Case Management and Employment Program (CCMEP) services. Consumers can receive assistance including job search, job skills, job training, education, and resume writing. Businesses receive services including job posting, applicant screening and referral, employer orientation and interviewing.

• Visitors to the OMJ center: 1,148

• Businesses served: 119

• WIOA funds expended on participants: \$46,525

\* Ohio Works First (OWF) provides time-limited cash assistance to needy families with (or expecting) children, by furnishing parents or specified relatives with work, training, and other support services they need to attain permanent self-sufficiency while meeting the family's ongoing basic needs. The funding for this program is a mixture of federal and state funds.

• New applications processed: 152

• 213 recipients: 192 children; 21 adults

• Client Benefits: \$397,590

\*The Food Assistance Program provides food assistance to eligible low-income Ohioans.

• New applications processed: 706

• 3,885 recipients: 1,697 children; 2,188 adults

• Client benefits: \$4,865,419

\*Child Care is a subsidized program that financially assists eligible Ohioans to obtain child care for their children while they work, go to school or are in a training program. Parents or caretakers can choose a provider or center that is licensed, certified and held to maintaining and complying with regulatory inspections and policies.

\*Ohio Medicaid provides access to health care with a wide array of medical benefits for eligible Ohioans.

\*\*Child Support provides services to help ensure that children receive the financial and medical support they are entitled to. By working with both parents, the program seeks to establish and enforce support orders and maintain consistent support payments.

**Senior Services** provides services for community members ages 60 and older. The funding for this program is from the Senior Services Sales Tax Levy.

## **Union County Agency Transportation Services**

(UCATS) provides transportation services primarily to residents needing assistance getting to medical appointments and seniors, ages 60 and over.

The goal is to protect children from harm and to maintain children in the least restrictive setting safely. Children services provides foster care and adoption services to provide temporary or permanent homes to children when it is not safe to remain in their home.


