The Home was visited by Miss L. A. Boylan, assistant to Dr. H. H. Goddard of the Bureau of Juvenile Research-Columbus, O. March, 14, 15.

The main purpose of this Survey was to get the mental capacity of each child. Knowing the mental age of each child we are better able to help him. Such an examination not only weeds out those who are feeble minded but brings

out the strong qualities as well  
of each individual.

We are then better able to train and develop the child along the lines for which he is best fitted. Of course some of the mentally defective children must have permanent institutional care, but there is a large group of these defectives who cannot take academic work beyond the 3<sup>d</sup> or 5<sup>th</sup> grades but who can be trained along industrial lines. This type, however, is usually very suggestible and follow the line of least resistance. Therefore it is essential that we learn to recognize this defect when the child is young to give him intensive training in some one useful line - train him in habits of right living - so he may become a useful, happy and good citizen. This in brief is the aim of the Survey being made in the various Institutions of Ohio. Know the child's mental capacity - train him to make the most of what abilities he has - and above all to help us to recognize the child's limited capacities and re-

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sponsibilities. Treat him according to his mental age rather than his physical growth. If we find a boy or girl of 16 yrs. who has a mental age of 9 yrs., we must learn to treat him as a 9 yr. old child and not expect him to cope with conditions and situations of the normal adult.

Our Home was saddened by the death of <sup>Mr.</sup> J. M. Hawn, president of our Board of Trustees, on Feb. 10, 1919. In all of the 12 years that he had been connected with the Home, he was invariably an urbane, genial, kind-hearted, sympathetic, Christian gentleman.

Mr. Hawn's time and advice was given cheerfully to further the interests of these dear children. He built a monument to himself in the affection he inspired, and his home-going is felt by each of us.
