KNOWN ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That we, *Mary Clark*
James Simpson, Hiram Kent &
John Smith
are held and firmly bound unto the State of Ohio in the sum of *two thousand six hundred*

dollars, to the payment of which well and truly to be made we bind ourselves, our heirs, executors, and administrators, jointly and severally, firmly by these presents: WITNESS our hands and seals this *third*

day of *August* A. D. 1847. WHEREAS, the Court have this day appointed *Mary Clark & James Simpson, Administrators*
of the estate of *Joseph D. Clark, Decd.*

Now if the said *Mary Clark & James Simpson* Administrators as aforesaid, shall make and return to the Court on oath within three months, a true inventory of all the moneys, goods, chattels, rights and credits, of the deceased which have or shall come to *their* possession and knowledge; or also if required by the Court an inventory of the real estate of the deceased:

Secondly. And administer according to law, all the moneys, goods, chattels, rights and credits; of the deceased and the proceeds of all *his* real estate that may be sold for the payment of *his* debts which may at any time come to the possession of the administrator or to the possession of any other person for *them*

Thirdly. And render upon oath a true account of *their* administration within eighteen months and at any other times when required by the Court or the law:

Fourthly. And pay any balance remaining in *their* hands upon the settlement of *their* accounts to such persons as the Court or the law shall direct.

Fifthly. And deliver the letters of administration into Court in case any will of the deceased shall be hereafter duly proven and allowed, then this obligation shall be void, otherwise be and remain in full force and virtue in law.

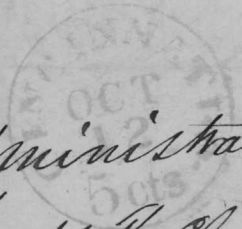
