- It's ok to set boundaries with family and finances.
- Make sure you set time aside for your own personal self-care.
- If you're feeling overwhelmed, reach out for help.

Locally, Maryhaven has crisis hotlines that individuals can contact at 1-800-731-5577 or can text "4help" to 85511. Maryhaven is open Monday through Friday from 8:00am to 12:00am and Saturday/Sunday from 5:00pm to 12:00am to assist someone that might be going through a crisis. Maryhaven is located at 715 South Plum Street in Marysville.

If you do need law enforcement assistance with someone that is having a difficult time, please be sure to contact your local law enforcement agency. Each of our law enforcement partners in Union County have CIT trained officers who are specially trained to assist someone who is in a mental health crisis.
