

Sheriff Patton would like to congratulate all the participants of the 2022 Citizens Academy! The Citizens Academy is a chance for members of the public to learn about all functions of the Sheriff's Office and to meet staff members. As one participant in the 2022 class commented, "I could make a hobby of this class". The course is held once a week for ten (10) weeks and concludes with graduation in December of each year. This year, the Citizens Academy was concluded before any snow storms.

Regarding "snow storms" Sheriff Patton and the Union County Sheriff's Office staff want to make sure you are ready. "The weather can change quickly in Ohio", says Sheriff Patton. Citizens of Union County need to understand what each snow emergency level means.

<u>Level 1</u>: Roadway advisory— Roadways are hazardous with blowing and drifting snow. Roadways are icy. Drive very cautiously.

<u>Level 2</u>: Roadway warning—Roadways are hazardous with blowing and drifting snow. Only those who feel it is necessary to drive should be out on the roadways. Contact your employer to see if you should report to work.

<u>Level 3</u>: Roadway emergency— All Township, County, State, and Municipal roadways are **CLOSED** to non-emergency personnel. No one should be out during these conditions unless it is absolutely necessary to travel. All employees should contact their employer to see if they should report to work. Those traveling on the roadways may subject themselves to an arrest or a citation.

Public Safety Officers are deputies cross trained to be an emergency medical technician and firefighter.







10. Who inspires you the most?


My mother is inspirational to me, because she stays positive despite every challenge she's faced. She also knows how to do practically everything and never shies away from challenges.









